#### Definitions

 Patient-centered care: "Providing care that is respectful of, and responsive to, individual patient preferences, needs and values, and ensuring that patient values guide all clinical decisions." (IOM,

2015)



# Interprofessional Education

- "Interprofessional education occurs when students from two or more professions learn about, from, and with each other to enable effective collaboration and improve health outcomes" (World Health Organization, 2010)
- Includes the following core competencies:
  - Values/Ethics for interprofessional practice
  - Roles/Responsibilities
  - Interprofessional communication
  - Teams and teamwork

#### **Values and Ethics**

- ➤ Place the interest of patient at the center of interprofessional care
- Respect the dignity and privacy of patients while maintaining confidentiality
- ➤ Work in cooperation with those who receive, provide or contribute to the delivery of health services
- Manage ethical dilemmas specific to interprofessional patients/population centered care situations
- Act with honesty and integrity in relationships with patients, families and other team members

#### **Roles and Responsibilities**

- Communicate one's roles and responsibilities
- Explain the roles and responsibilities of team members and how the team works together to provide care
- ➤ Use unique and complementary abilities of all members of the team to optimize patient care

#### **Communication**

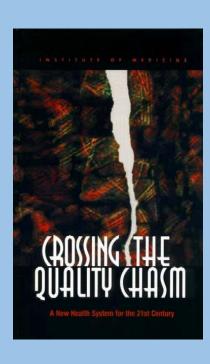
- ➤ Engage in active listening and encourage ideas and opinions
- ➤ Give timely, sensitive and instructive feedback
- ➤ Organize and communicate information that is in a form that is understandable
- ➤ Choose effective communication tools
- Express one's knowledge and opinions with confidence, clarity and respect, working to ensure common understanding of information and treatment and care decisions

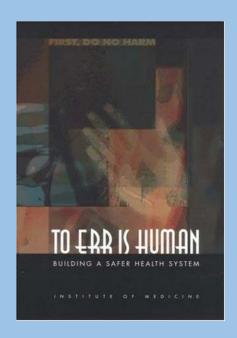
#### **Teams and Teamwork**

- ➤ Describe the process of team development and the roles and practices of effective teams
- Engage other health professionals in shared patientcentered problem-solving
- Engage self and others to constructively manage disagreement about values, roles, goals and actions
- ➤ Reflect on individual and team performance for individual as well as team performance improvement

# Intersecting IPE and Patient-Centered Care

 "To improve the quality of healthcare delivery to patients and populations by training health care professional students to function effectively and safely as members of collaborative interprofessional teams" (2008 Don Berwick, Tom Nolan and John Wittington-TRIPLE AIM)





# Problems in Health Care Which Could be Addressed with Interprofessional Collaboration

- Patient safety is not optimal in all patient care settings
- Care is fragmented among different health care professionals
- Health care is not consistently of high quality
- Some populations have limited access to care
- Cost of care is excessive but yet needs of patients are not consistently met

### Aims of Health Care System Redesign

**Safe** – avoiding injury to patients from care that is intended to help them

**Effective** – providing services based on scientific knowledge to all who could benefit and refraining from providing services to those not likely to benefit (avoiding underuse and overuse, respectively).

**Patient-centered** – providing care that is respectful of and responsive to individual patient preferences, needs, and values and ensuring that patient values guide all clinical decisions.

**Timely** – reducing waits and sometimes harmful delays for both those who receive and those who give care.

**Efficient** – avoiding waste, including waste of equipment, supplies, ideas, and energy.

**Equitable** – providing care that does not vary in quality because of personal characteristics such as gender, ethnicity, geographic location, and socioeconomic status.

# Intersecting IPE and Patient-centered care at OUHSC

- EPIC: Empowering patients through interprofessional care
  - Pilot project of the OU Health Sciences Center Interprofessional Education and Practice Collaborative (HSCIPEPEC)
  - 80 students in 8 teams over two semesters.
    - First semester was team building, didactic content on IPE competencies
    - 2<sup>nd</sup> semester spent delivering care to low-income/uninsured patients at Good Shepherd Clinic

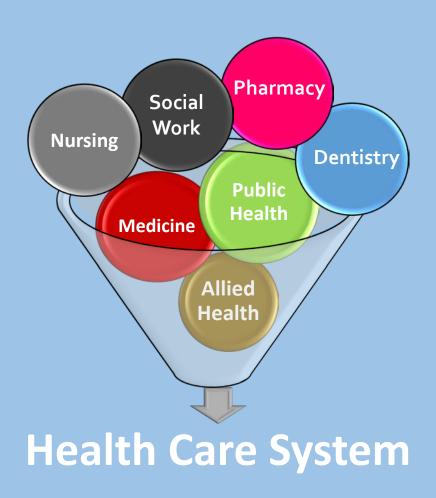

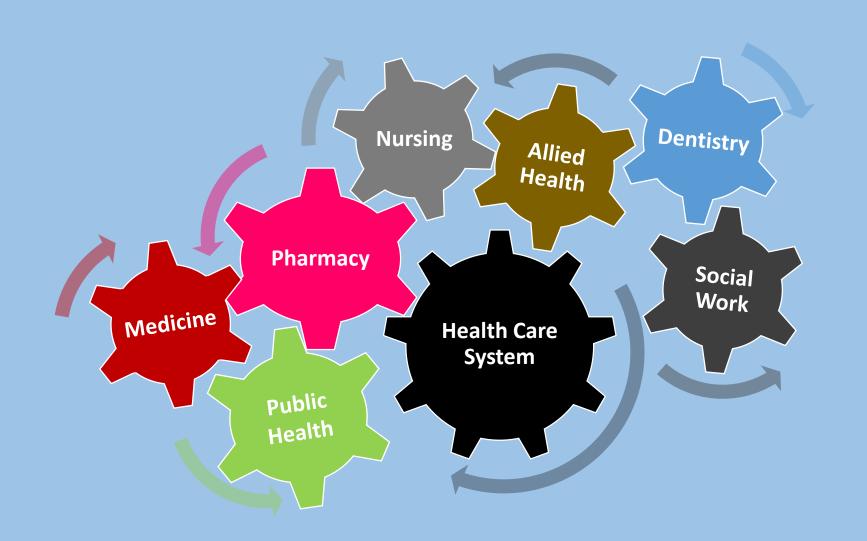
# Success of project

- EPIC project for two years
  - Students gained IPE competencies
  - Satisfaction with patient-focused component was high
  - Patients were involved in discussions regarding team's success
  - One team hosted cooking class for two patients to help them gain skills in creating low-cost, nutritious meals.
     This included pooling money and buying the patients crock pots so they could prepare their meals while working.

## Ramping up

 "All health professionals should be educated to deliver patient-centered care as members of an interdisciplinary team, emphasizing evidence-based practice, quality improvement approaches, and informatics." National Academies Press, 2003

## Ramping up at OUHSC

- All Professions Day:
  - Launched Fall 2015 with over 800 students representing 22 different programs from all OUHSC colleges and the College of Social Work.
  - Two 4-hour didactic sessions; APD 1 in Fall semester followed by service learning project then APD 2 in the Spring semester. Select group of 80 students in EPIC.
  - APD 1 addressed the core IPE competencies with teambuilding activities.
  - APD 2 built on team-building with added component of patient-centered care with guest appearance from a live volunteer patient from Good Shepherd Clinic.

# All Professions Day year 2

- Evaluations of Year One APD experience were good overall for achieving objectives of greater understanding and appreciation of interprofessional education in general and the core IPE competencies in particular.
- Students overwhelmingly felt that the clinical vignette added value to the session...and they wanted more live patient-centered care.
- So... we attempted to add more clinical (patient-centered care) to the experience.

# Year 2: the Case Management/Population Health pilot

- Accelerating Interprofessional Community-Based Education and Practice grant from the Josiah Macy Foundation.
- We applied for funding that would expand the clinical opportunities for interprofessional education from the 80 students in EPIC to 200 students.
- Proposal was to place 12 teams of 10 students each with Case Management (College of Nursing) and the OU Physicians Population Health Department focusing on patient-centered, value-based care for patients at high risk for utilization of health care services and those who have complex conditions.

#### Year 2 APD

- CM/PH pilot
- 120 students from 5 OUHSC colleges and College of Social Work representing 8 different programs.
- Completed 10 hours of Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) modules
- Met three times (2-hour sessions) Tuesday evenings
- Clinical vignettes drawn from OU Physicians population health clinic with focus on social determinants of health and patient-centered care.

# Results of CM/PH pilot

- Generally well-accepted
- Liked it better than service-learning projects
- Teams did not develop as well as EPIC groups
- Overwhelming desire to have "real" patients



"We like to bring together people from radically different fields and wait for the friction to produce heat, light and magic. Sometimes it takes a while."

#### IPE and Patient-centered care

 To truly achieve patient-centered care, the health care professional needs to become aware of and comfortable with their own role and responsibilities and more importantly the limitations of their abilities.

Sometimes... you are not the one (role)

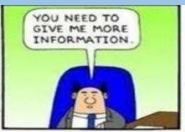

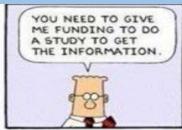


# Challenges

- Maintaining focus on the patient.















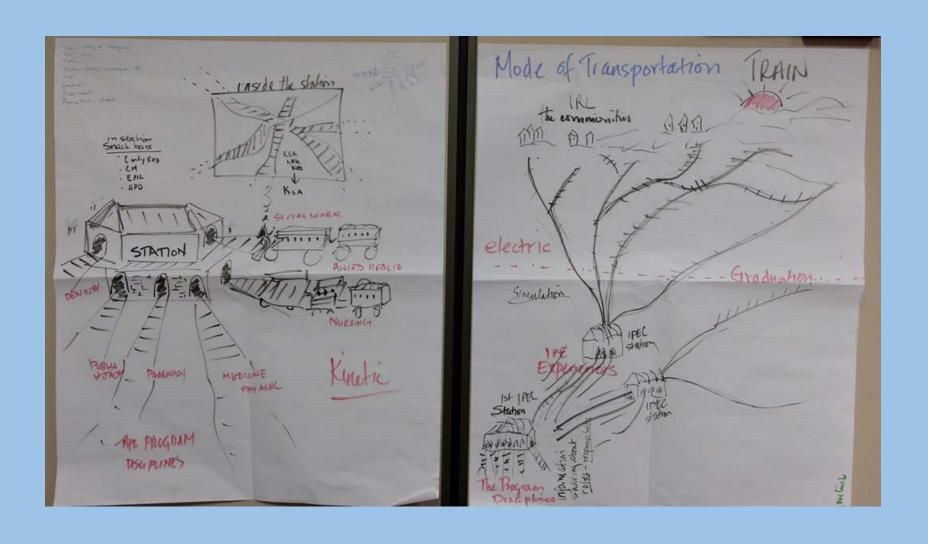


#### Where are we now?
