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In the IPEC "Core Competencies for Interprofessional Collaborative Practice" the four domains include:

- Values/Ethics for Interprofessional Practice. Work with individuals of other professions to maintain a climate of mutual respect and shared values.
- Roles/Responsibilities for Collaborative Practice. Use the knowledge of one's own role and those of other professions to appropriately assess and address health care needs of the patients and populations served.
- Interprofessional Communication. Communicate with patients, families, communities, and other health professionals in a responsive and responsible manner that supports a team approach to the maintenance of health and treatment of disease.
- Interprofessional Teamwork and Team-based Care. Apply relationship-building values and the principles of team dynamics to perform effectively in different team roles to plan and deliver patient/population-centered care that is safe, timely, efficient, effective and equitable.
