
DR. DALE **BRATZLER**

Dale W. Bratzler, DO, MPH, is **Professor and Chair of the Department of Health**Administration and Policy at the Hudson College of Public Health, and Professor in the College of Medicine at the University of Oklahoma (OU) Health Sciences Center. He was recently asked to assume the role of Chief COVID Officer for the University of Oklahoma. He also serves as the Enterprise Chief Quality Officer for the three-hospital health system and faculty practice at OU Medicine. His experience in health care quality improvement includes working with CMS on the development and maintenance of national performance measures used to profile and report on the quality of inpatient and outpatient health care. He has served two terms as president of the American Health Quality Association and is a past member of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality National Advisory Council and the CDC Healthcare Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee.

He has given more than **600 lectures nationally on health care quality topics** with a particular emphasis on prevention of surgical site infections and adult vaccination. Board certified in internal medicine, he is a Master Fellow of the American College of Osteopathic Internists, and a Fellow of the Infectious Diseases Society of America.

Remember when......

 On 31 December 2019, the WHO China Country Office was informed of cases of pneumonia of unknown etiology (unknown cause) detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province of China.

- SARS-CoV-2, a "novel" coronavirus
 - humans have no immunity to it which has resulted in rapid spread of the infection. It is very contagious.



How is it transmitted?

- Primarily through person-to-person spread among close contacts
 - Through respiratory droplets and aerosols produced when an infected person breaths, talks, sings, coughs, or sneezes.
- A person may get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or eyes. This is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.*



How You May Transmit COVID-19 Coronavirus From Talking Without Coughing Or Sneezing





Symptoms – our understanding has evolved


- The following symptoms may appear 2–14 days after exposure (but most commonly occur within 4-5 days)
 - Fever or chills
 - Cough
 - Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
 - Fatigue
 - Muscle or body aches
 - Headache
 - New loss of taste or smell
 - Sore throat
 - Congestion or runny nose
 - Nausea or vomiting
 - Diarrhea

Estimates of U.S. prevalence of adults aged > 18 years with any selected underlying medical condition. (Risks for COVID)



Status of the Pandemic





- 151,674 deaths in the United States




Daily New Cases with 7-day Rolling Average






COVID PCR Tests Done Per Week, and Percent Positive






Total Hospitalizations – Confirmed and PUIs

Prevention

- No current vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) (Phase III clinical trials in progress)
 - Moderna (mRNA-1273 a "genetic vaccine")
 - AstraZeneca / University of Oxford (a viral vector vaccine)
- No medications, vitamins, or supplements have been shown to prevent the disease
- For now, the best way to prevent illness—avoid being exposed to this virus



Treatment

- Supportive care has gotten better; supplies of PPE are improved
- A number of drugs have been shown to either reduce mortality or shorten hospital stay in clinical trials:
 - Dexamethasone (corticosteroid)¹
 - Remdesivir (anti-viral)²
- Some evidence that reducing the viral inoculum (by wearing a mask) results in less severe or asymptomatic disease

Campus Reopening

• To ensure University operations continue in an effective manner and that risk of the spread of COVID-19 is mitigated, managers are encouraged to continue telecommuting for employees who are able to do so, subject to the following guidelines.

• Each college dean and area vice president (or their designees) are responsible for determining the telecommuting versus in-person staffing needs for their respective areas.



Masks

• Masks must be worn by all passengers in University-provided transportation, such as shuttles, buses, police safety escorts, and University owned/leased vehicles. Drivers of any University vehicles must wear a mask when passengers are present. Masks must also be worn in outdoor campus spaces where social distancing cannot be maintained. Scarves, bandanas, and the like are not adequate. Masks must cover the nose and mouth.


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
